

Garden Fence Installation Instructions

Tools Required

- Gloves (recommended for handling wire)
- Tape measure
- Stakes or posts (optional, for additional stability)

Step 1: Plan the Layout

1. **Measure the Area:** Determine the length and shape of the area to fence (e.g., garden perimeter, flower bed, or pet enclosure).
2. **Mark Boundaries:** Use stakes or spray paint to outline the installation path, ensuring it's straight or follows curves as needed.

Step 2: Prepare the Fence

1. **Unroll the Fence:** Lay the rolled fence flat on the ground and unroll it along the marked boundary.
2. **Adjust Length:** Cut the fence to the desired length using wire cutters (if necessary). Note: The fence is 25 feet long and can be trimmed for smaller areas.

Step 3: Install the Fence

Option A: Direct Ground Insertion (for soft soil):

1. **Bury the Base:** Dig a shallow trench (2–3 inches deep) along the marked path.
2. **Secure the Fence:** Place the fence in the trench, ensuring the bottom edge is flush with the ground. Backfill the soil and tamp it down firmly to stabilize the base.

Option B: Stake or Post Mounting (for extra stability):

1. **Install Stakes/Posts:** Space stakes or posts every 3–5 feet along the fence line. Hammer wooden/metal stakes 6–8 inches into the ground.
2. **Attach the Fence:** Use zip ties or wire clips to secure the fence to the stakes/posts, starting from the bottom and working upward. Ensure the fence is taut and aligned.

Step 4: Handle Curves or Corners

- **Curves:** Gently bend the fence to follow the curve, securing it with additional stakes along the bend.
- **Corners:** At 90-degree angles, overlap the fence ends by 6 inches and fasten them with wire clips for a secure joint.

Step 5: Final Checks

1. **Test Stability:** Gently pull on the fence to ensure it's firmly anchored.

Add more stakes if needed.

2. **Trim Excess:** Cut any protruding wire ends with wire cutters, ensuring no sharp edges are exposed.
